

What to know when Gen Z Votes in the 2020 Election!

For the upcoming Presidential Election, on November 3rd, 2020, 16 million more people from Generation Z will be eligible to vote, making a total number of 23 million Gen Z voters. As the election date is coming up, more people are turning their heads towards Gen Z voters and if they will actually turn up to vote. According to a Pew Research Center survey, they noted that Gen Z voters make up 1 in 10 of eligible voters. This means that if Gen Z turns in their ballots and makes it to the polls, then we could make a significant impact on the outcome of this election. A survey conducted by Marymount Manhattan College's Public Affairs & Political Reporting class shows that 98.6% of those polled were confident that Gen Z can create change in this election on a scale from a little, to a lot, to a great deal.

You are the next generation of voters, which means if Gen Z solidifies their voting efforts in mass then they will be able to have a finger on the pulse of what happens in this country. From another <u>Pew Research Center survey</u>, "seven-in-ten Gen Zers say that the government should do more to solve problems." What are the issues most important to Gen Z in the 2020 Election? Marymount survey shows that Climate Change, Social Justice/BLM, and Gun Violence are the most important generational issues to Gen Zers. Other issues, such as prison reform, immigration, education reform, LGBTQ+ rights, and women's rights are also impacting how Gen Z votes. These issues are on the line in this upcoming election, which is why it is important to feel informed and empowered when casting your vote because every vote truly matters.

According to a survey conducted by the Pew Research Center, 70% of Gen Z responders want the government to do more to solve problems. This makes Gen Z more likely than other generations to want an activist government and take control of the issues they strive to have addressed. Gen Z often takes to social media to advocate their activism and social media is often where they read their news. In the Marymount survey, it shows that 63.38% of those who responded get their news from Twitter, and the other popular social media platforms including Instagram, Facebook, Tiktok, and Youtube. Although only 49.30% of those who took the Marymount survey responded saying they feel properly informed on the issues being discussed in this election cycle. Social media has become a hub of Gen Z teaming together to spread information. On Tiktok, Gen Zers have created platforms such as @tiktokforbiden where they urge young people to vote and get involved in helping people register to vote and get involved in other events.

Ultimately, with this surge of new voters, there is a lot of power in the hands of Gen Z if they act on their voting capabilities and turn up at the polls. In a focus group I conducted for the upcoming election, my peers expressed fear and mistrust in the vote-by-mail systems after they have seen stories of USPS drop boxes being picked up and stories of people never receiving their absentee ballots. However, the vote-by-mail program has been used <u>dating back to the Civil War</u>. Absentee voting was implemented as a way of making sure the soldiers could vote even when they were on the field. Absentee voting was used again during WWII when 3.2 million soldiers cast their votes from abroad. This system is not new and it has worked in the past. Now that we are in the middle of a pandemic, <u>75% of America</u> will be voting by mail. As observed from the Marymount survey, 57.58% of responders said they will be voting by mail. Many people in the survey expressed that they feel like the vote-by-mail system will be compromised. Although it will take an extended amount of time to count the ballots, it is important to remain aware of the issues and vote for a candidate who will not cause fear in the system and cause fear in the constituents. Voting for someone who is concerned about the issues that affect you and the way you live your life is crucial. This election guide will outline how candidates address the top Gen Z issues of Climate Change, Social Justice & BLM, and Gun Violence.

I conducted a focus group to get a sense of Gen Zer's true issues with the help of some of my peers. In response to my question of "If the election were today, who would you vote for?" everyone begrudgingly responded that they would settle for Biden. When I asked if anyone had considered a third-party candidate, a few people in my group responded that they would be voting for a third-party candidate or consider one if this election had not been so important. One of my peers, in particular, expressed worry about how the issues they held most important would be handled by the current administration because "Trump is ruining everything forever." In the Marymount survey, it shows that 95.52% of those surveyed will be voting for the Joe Biden and Kamala Harris ticket.

State Issues in California: Which Races to Pay Attention to?

Taking a look at California's State Senate races, you may be wondering why this matters to you. The California State Senate is the upper chamber of the California State Legislature and works alongside the California State Assembly, making up the legislative branch. They play an important role working with the Governor to create laws and create the state budget. There are a total of 40 Senators, and for this election there are 20 seats in the senate up for grabs. The Senators are elected for 4-year terms and they represent approximately 931,349 Californians each. Democrats are trying to expand their supermajority, as they already occupy three-quarters of the seats in the Senate. In this election, it is coming down to a few competitive races where there are intra party Democrats going head to head and also a few Republican incumbents running against Democrats. For the major issues of Climate Change, Social Justice/BLM, and Gun Violence, it is crucial to look at the state races because the State Senate makes the legislature that will directly affect your community and district. These are the changes we see within our communities and to the people we care most about.

Which of these State Senate Races are game changers?

District 23

This district is located in San Bernardino County, which typically runs more conservatively. However, there has been a decline in GOP registration numbers which means there is a tougher race than usual in this inland area. The candidate in this race are two daughters of immigrants, who both hold positions on the local school board.

District 15

This district includes the Santa Clara Valley, One Infinite Loop in Cupertino, East San Jose, Downtown San Jose, and Little Saigon. The Incumbent, Senator Jim Beall, has held office since his late 20s and is now termed out, meaning that this district has an important choice to make between two Democrats. One of the candidates, Dave Cortese, has been the county supervisor since 2008 and knows San Jose very well. The other candidate, Ann Ravel, worked as a U.S. Justice Department lawyer and was on the FEC but resigned when Trump was inaugurated; she is endorsed by Barack Obama.


Looking Locally: What issues are on the ballot in Oceanside, California?

Looking locally to Oceanside, California, located in North San Diego County, there are a few different elections currently underway. Local elections are important because they have an immediate effect on the place you call home. A survey conducted by the Knight Foundation found that in late 2019 and early 2020, 21% of 18-29 year old Americans said that they follow the news about local issues that are affecting their communities. However, 7 in 10 Americans say the news media plays an important role in making them feel connected to their local communities. The peers from my focus group explained that they do not tend to follow their local news channels unless their parents have the local news channel on the television. This lack of focus on the local news in your community causes a distinct difference in the way local elections play out. If you are wondering to yourself why you never see any difference being made on climate change in your community, it starts with the people holding positions in your

local government. For Oceanside, it is a tricky area because there is the Camp Pendleton Marine Corps Base which tends to have a more conservative voter pool, but there is also a growing number of people in the area becoming concerned with the environment.

Out of 12 candidates running for the position of mayor in Oceanside, there are only a few that target the Gen Z issues of Climate Change, Social Justice & BLM, and Gun Violence. After the death of George Floyd, there were countless protests all over Oceanside to raise awareness of police brutality and racism. There are also many environmental concerns and initiatives with Oceanside's beaches and waterways. It comes down to the question of who will represent Gen Z's issues in this community.

Here are a few candidates that align with the Gen Z issues:



• Focusing on investments in communities of concern

It is a privilege to have so many resources and communities to get involved with. There are many inclusive groups to bring power to the people, such as the Tiktok communities created to spread information to young people and encourage them to vote. There are 23 million eligible Gen Z voters, which means if they come together in mass to vote, there could be a huge impact. It is just a matter of researching the issues that affect you, filling out your ballot, voting early, or showing up at the polls on November 3rd, 2020. The power is in your hands and your vote cannot be taken away.

If you cannot vote yet but you still want to get involved there are many resources out there. You can sign up to become a poll worker, by clicking <u>here</u>. If you are 16 and a United States citizen, then you can sign up to make a difference in your community as a poll worker. Another way of getting involved is by signing up at a phone bank to call voters in key states to talk to them about how they are going to vote on election day. The most important way of making a difference is by researching the topics you are interested in and advocating them. Many times, just the simple action of discussing topics that matter to you with friends or family can make a huge difference and it could change some people's point of view.

Voting is a great power to have and it is a privilege. Voting is the answer to any of your qualms with the government, locally, state-wide, and nationally. The decision making power is in your hands.
